

For those that do not know, my mother, Janet Flavel died a few days back. It was not an unexpected passing, but it still is painful and has given me a good opportunity to reflect on things. Some of this may be rambling, but they are thoughts that I find worth mentioning, nonetheless.

My mom spent the last 15-ish years of her life with the slow and merciless process of dementia. I gradually lost more and more of my mother until she was completely gone. We often think of our soul complex from a theoretical point of view. I got to watch the slow deconstruction of that complex over the march of years. This illustrated to me, in the most profound of ways, how we are all made up of pieces that make us "us," and as those were stripped from her one at a time, it taught me a lot. I feel I now understand what's meant when Óðinn says in the Grímnismál "For Hugin I fear lest he come not home, But for Munin my care is more."

I also am deeply comforted in the knowledge that my mother will look on from beyond the veil and watch over my family. I know we all think that, or "believe" this to be true but I FEEL it now in a profound way.

I don't write this to be morose, but I wanted to share some things that have been on my mind. Life is short. The older I get, the more aware I am aware of that. There is limited time, and we all have so many dreams to accomplish. The time is now, don't waste time, don't waste opportunity to build your legacy. Also, as I have come to understand, the best way to stave off senility is to keep mentally active. Always learn more, always think critically, always strive to be more than you are. A thought to leave you thinking on this month—our myths illustrate time and again that entropy occurs when we stand still. If we don't strive, if we don't move forward, the pull towards degeneration and chaos wins. The key to legacy is constant motion, doing more, achieving more, being more. By doing this, we stay one step ahead of the wolf.

Hexennacht Ritual



At Hexennacht, my blots tend to focus on the magic of women and gifts to the goddess Freyja. Three "mighty women" are called upon during Blot to bless the Folk with fire and smoke for protection in all realms, material, physical, emotional, and spiritual. Freyja, skilled in seidr, is given our gifts of gratitude and devotion and we ask for her to bless the folk with strength, determination, self-awareness, and skill to let us work our own "magic" in our own lives, in whatever way we can, whether that be through crafting and creating, building our physical and spiritual selves to greatness, or destroying all obstacles in our paths to victory.

Items needed: Horn Mead Bowl Cauldron A stick to suspend the cauldron Sand (if using cauldron, fill the bottom of the cauldron with sand) Charcoal Lighter Lavender Rosemary Mugwort

Assistants: 3 ladies of the folk

Gather your folk and have the women bless the mead. Enter the ritual space in a sunwise motion, forming a circle around the central altar.

"Hail the Holy Æsir, Gods and Goddesses of our Folk! We ask you to join us today as we honor your kin! Hail the Æsir!

Hail to the Honored Ancestors, Mothers and Fathers as far back as time remembers! We ask you to join your sons and daughters gathered here and witness our devotion! Hail the Ancestors!

Hail the Friendly Vaetter, spirits of this land and place! We as you to look upon us in worship, see our deeds! Hail the Vaetter!"

"Freyja! Beautiful goddess of both power and beauty, of strength and love, We give gifts of ourselves to you! We give you our devotion, our love, our respect, and our might! Hail to you, Freyja! The daughter of Njord, The wife of Odr, The sister of Frey, The mother of Hnoss and Gersemi, You show us the power of love, The power of strength, The power of endurance. You show us the power of the mothers, of the daughters, of the sisters and of the wives! You teach us to be better women! You inspire us to be better men! Folk, prepare your gifts for Freyja. From your heart to your hand, and from your hand to the horn, give the best and brightest of yourselves to her."

Ask your hornbearer to collect the gifts of the Folk

"Freyja! The horn is heavy with the gifts of your Folk.

If you find them worthy, take them from us now."

Hold the horn high and await the acceptance of Freyja. Pour the gifts into the bowl. Refill the horn.

"Freyja, we have given you our gifts and we ask that if you find these folk worthy, bless us with gifts of your own.

We ask you to bless us with strength and will,

The ability to find our own power within,

To overcome and to achieve our goals.

Let us find that spark within ourselves, our own "magic", our own gifts and talents. Hail Freyja!"

Receive the gifts of Freyja. Walk the horn around the circle of gathered folk and offer them the gifts of Freyja. Pour remaining mead from the horn in the bowl. Light the charcoal disc and place on top of the sand in the cauldron.

"Hexennacht, in days of old, was the time of movement and preparation, of both folk and animals.

A time of transition and of magic.

Our folk gathered, men and women, young and old, in celebration.

As the herds and menfolk who tended them went out to pasture, they were blessed for protection and strength, and for a safe return.

Fires were tended, celebration made, and prayers spoken.

The magic of the Folk, was sent with the men and the herds.

They were sent with hope. They were sent with song, dance, blessings, and joy for the future.

As in days of olde, our women will bless you now.

Though you may not be tending the herds, remember you are tending your families, and leading your Folk to victory."

Motion your first assistant to come forward. She will place the lavender on top of the charcoal.

"The first woman approaches, With the devotion of a daughter, With the love of a sister, And with the compassion of a friend, She lends herself to the Folk.

To bless you and to remind you that you are loved and never alone."

The first assistant should take her place at one end of the stick if a cauldron is being used.

Motion the second assistant to come forward. She will place the rosemary on top of the charcoal.

"The second woman approaches, With the support of a wife, With the protection of a mother, And with the strength of an aunt, She lends herself to the Folk. To bless you and to remind you that you will always be protected and supported."

The second assistant should take her place at the other end of the stick if a cauldron is being used. Motion for the third assistant to come forward. She will place the mugwort on top of the charcoal.

"The third woman approaches, With the wisdom of the grandmother, With the memories of the great-grandmother, And with the ancient knowledge of the Disir. She lends herself to the Folk, To bless you and to remind you of your own immortality"

The third assistant should take the fan. All three women should move together around the circle, blessing the folk with the smoke from the cauldron.

"May the Gods and the Ancestors bless you with strength! With love! With protection! With victory!"

After the blessing is completed, close the blot.

"This blot has ended. We have given our gifts and received gifts in return. Take the blessings of Freyja and the blessings of your women.

Go forward with passion, with strength, and achieve the victory that awaits you! Hail the Gods! Hail the Folk!! Hail the AFA!!!"

Words from Our Gothar

Individualism and the Clan



Our Germanic world view puts unity ahead of all else. Individuality has no context outside that of the clan. The power of o is orderly and harmonious; it follows r (the right path). It is here where peace and freedom reign. Our ancestors compared "the group of kinsmen to a fence, Stave by Stave, enclosing a sacred ground. When one is struck down, there is a breach in the clan, and the ground lies open to be trampled on."

This is Frith, and to be removed from that enclosure, to be deprived of human context is to be obliterated. Worse than death one becomes a Niðing.

If personal sympathies and antipathies can never stand up to the authority of Frith, how did this ideal of individualism come to take such a grip on our Folk? Particularly in America, where it was even further aggrandized to a "rugged individualism". What causes someone to want to distance themselves from their people, their clan, or even their immediate family in extreme cases?

Well, we know the sacral locus of most Folk-religions is the Folk community itself. The sacrality of the community is expressed in rituals celebrating the relationship with their own gods and "promote a strong sense of in-group identification and loyalty." In contrast universal religions have the salvation of the individual as the sacral locus. Gilbert Murray states "It is an atmosphere in which the aim of the good man is not so much to live justly, to help the society to which he belongs and enjoy the esteem of his fellow creatures; but rather, a means of a burning faith, by contempt for the world and its standards, by ecstasy, suffering and martyrdom, to be granted pardon for his unspeakable unworthiness."

The Chinese experienced this in the third century when instead of the Confucian ideals of preservation of the body and perpetuation of the family, many turned to Buddhism with its celibacy and ritual acts of body mortification, albeit with much less impact.

People in individualist cultures are less aware of Innangard / Utangard boundaries. They show little emotional commitment or loyalty to the Innangard and do not hold a sense of common Wyrd with other members.

But this atomized existence is not in harmony with the cosmos (Xartus). Our Folk-Soul aches for those connections to be re-established. The dissonance of not living in harmony with the natural order or primal laws harms our Folk in various ways. Like a missing limb we experience that phantom pain. We have been taught independence is the goal to strive for, but interdependence is the ultimate goal. One moves from being wholly dependent as a child, to being independent, to reach our full potential though we must let go of that independence and become interdependent with the clan. *g* is the rune of sacrifice (making sacred). This is the mystery of the interdependence not just between men, but between the gods and men.

Of all the baggage those of us raised Christian carry, this hyper-individualism is the most detrimental and hardest to shake. Some may even mistakenly come to Asatru for their individual bona fides (being Asatru to distance oneself from Christianity is not

pious) and will either embrace the natural order of tribe over the individual, as is our folkway, or they will withdraw to their solitary practices, free of the obligations required by Frith. Individualism is the easy path, but it is not the right path. Freed from that limitation of individualism they grow stronger and make our folk stronger as a whole.

This is the deeper value of our motto "Asatru is about roots, it's about connections, it's about coming home." Only within that fence of Frith do we find the freedom to become who we capable of being. It is here where the divine speaks the loudest to us, it reverberates off our members and is amplified in a way that is impossible for the individual. It requires sacrifice of the individual as exemplified by the All-Father. Óðinn did not sacrifice himself to himself to gain the knowledge of the runes for himself, he did it for the Æsir that they could bring order to the cosmos for the benefit of the descendants of Ask and Embla.

Orthodoxy in Asatru



We live in a time where "dogma", "doctrine", and "orthodox" are considered bad words, especially in "pagan" circles. This is because these words all bring to mind images of Christianity during the high Middle Ages: images of priests, ceremony, ritual, rules, and ostracizing when those rules are broken.

These concepts are NOT Christian concepts. They are simply religious concepts in general!

Many "pagans" in our modern times will say that Asatru is about following your heart, not listening to anyone else, only connecting with the Gods to "work" with them, etc.... This is demonstrably incorrect, a major disservice to our ancestors, and egregiously impious.

Our ancestors did, in fact, believe in hard truths about our faith, as did every other ethnic group regarding their ethnic faith, as did every universal faith, and so on. Much of Asatru was not up for debate, just like one would see in any real religion. For example, imagine debating with a Christian about whether or not Satan is evil. It sounds quite silly, doesn't it? Christians will not bend on this, because it is part of the orthodoxy of their faith, and it would cease to be a religion if this were simply a matter of personal opinion!

Asatru should be, and is, much the same in that regard. There are hard facts in our faith: the Gods are real, Loki is not worthy of worship, the runes have power, and so on. None of these points are up for debate, and none of these are a matter of opinion if you are truly Asatru. If you disagree with any of these points, then Asatru is a purely academic pursuit for you.


Asatru is a REAL faith, with REAL rules, where our people connect with our REAL Gods. Anyone who says otherwise is not seriously interested in this faith.

- 4. We need to find lenders and build a war chest.


This is not a "quick" process so stay patient and resolute. As we progress, I will keep you all updated on our progress!




Sigrheim: Home of Victory





Day of Remembrance

Jarl Haakon



Jarl Haakon, or Haakon Sigurdsson, son of the Norwegian earl of Lade, was exiled to Denmark after the murder of his father by Harald II Graycloak. He soon allied with Harald Bluetooth and they overthrew his father's murderer. While Haakon became the sovereign in the west, Harald Bluetooth annexed southeastern Norway. The two would again join forces when Bluetooth needed aid in fighting against the Holy Roman Emperor Otto II in 974.

Though forced into baptism Haakon's faith in his gods was so strong that he was not only able to revolt against Bluetooth's efforts to Christianize Norway for a time, but

also to spread and expand his faith in his lands. In the end, powers that he could not control began to sway the attitudes of his men and he was killed by one of his own retainers.

Jarl Haakon was the last Asatru Ruler of Norway, his death in 995 CE leading directly to the takeover by Olaf Tryggvason.

So, what can we learn from this story?

There will always be people in our lives who do not understand our faith or our dedication to our faith. Even our friends might choose to try and change our minds. When the people we have trusted do this we can sometimes find ourselves doubting our choices, even if for just a moment. 'What if?' Take that breath and reaffirm your faith. It isn't always going to be easy, but nothing that is worth anything ever is.

With dedication can come reward. We might not be able to make everyone understand our values and our beliefs, but for every person who turns away, there is a person somewhere whose mind can be opened by our words. There is that person whose soul longs to 'come home'. They just don't know it yet. Perhaps your words, your dedication, your belief will be the thing that helps someone else find their way, and what better reward could there be for standing strong?

We must also take a moment to remember to curb our arrogance. When we become too sure of ourselves and our ability to stand tall against everything that would fight us, we can become blinded by the reality of the situation around us. Always remember to take time to take the measure of the situation. Take the time to know if it is a good time to talk or to hold your tongue.

John Gibbs-Bailey "Hoskuld"



This year, on April 22, the AFA marks the first official celebration of a Day of Remembrance for John Gibbs-Bailey, known as "Hoskuld".

Hoskuld was one of the two founders of the Odinic Rite (along with John Yeowell, "Stubba"). Although writings on that organization's website indicate his efforts were integral to the foundation of the OR, only limited information about him is available. There are no books or articles to be found that he authored, no pictures of him publicly available. Even in the Odinic Rite eulogy for him, it is stated that they did not know when he was born, or even when he passed away.

Gibbs-Bailey embraced Asatru in the 1930's. He was a member of a number of smaller Asatru organizations from that time. While working with the different groups with which he was affiliated, Hoskuld developed the "Eight Charges and Virtues" of Asatru. These would later be expanded to Nine, in the 1970's, and promulgated by the Odinic Rite as the well-known "Nine Noble Virtues".

Hoskuld met John Yeowell, Stubba, in the 1950's. Gibbs-Bailey's influence played a strong role in Stubba's conversion to Asatru. In 1973, Stubba and Hoskuld formed The Committee for the Restoration of the Odinic Rite, changed to the Odinic Rite in 1979 (at that point they felt the rite had been restored). Hoskuld served as the first Treasurer

of the Odinic Rite.

It is important that we honor and remember not only the heroes of the distant past, but those in more recent days whose efforts have contributed to the renewal of our Faith.

Holiday

Hexennacht



When the ground was thawed, and the colder weather was beginning to give way to it became necessary to move the cattle from the winter fields to the summer ones. Hexennacht, traditionally, was a festival celebrating this very thing. The main focus of

the holiday was the bonfire. The men would all gather and build the large need-fire. They would then walk the cattle through the smoke to bless them before rehoming them for the warm months. Often the men would call on Frey during Hexennacht, asking for fertility and abundance.

While the men were off blessing the cattle the women gathered together for their own festivities. They had their own bonfires, and it was during this time that the women often burned herbs and practiced their local magic or Seidr. As the men called on Frey, the woman would often call on Freyja.

After the separate celebrations, men and women would come together and continue the festivities.

We in the AFA celebrate this day as Hexennacht instead of the more common "Walpurgisnacht". Walpurgisnacht is named such because it is the night before the Christian feast day honoring Saint Walpurga, who was credited with healing and repelling witches.

Men and women celebrating separately and then coming together are one of the main features of Hexennacht, as well as the bonfire. A good way to celebrate the holiday might include the men building the bonfire while the women practice communal Seidr. When they are finished the men and woman can join together around the bonfire. The women can throw herbs into the fire, and, asking for the blessings of Frey and Freyja, the men, women, and children can each take turns walking through the smoke.







Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made

cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Ostara Stew



A unique stew.

I love cooking for the Hofs. Every so often I get to cook something really special. Oddly enough this year my cooking was served at three of the fours Hofs for Ostara. I know kinda cool right. Homemade bratwurst that I had made and brought with me when I visited Baldrshof for Yule was served on Saturdays lunch at Baldrshof. To help The Chef of Thorshof I fixed a Cajun Grits Scramble for Thorshof breakfast on Saturday. For Njordshof I got to make a very special stew.

While visiting Thorshof I helped with the pulled pork dinner. So naturally as any southern cook would ask, "hey what are y'all doing with the pork bones?"

"Oh just going to throw them away?"

"Can I have them?!?"

"ok....."

So they made there way back to Florida and were cooked down into thick bone stock. That stock became the base for Njordshof's Ostara Rabbit Stew.

5 Rabbits, cleaned/boiled/picked
2lbs Chicken breast, cut into chunks to bulk up stew if needed
2lbs Carrots sliced
5 sm Turnups, peeled/quartered/sliced
5 lg white onions, sliced
1 head of celery, sliced
6qts stock (ham or chicken will work)
2 sticks butter
fresh thyme, removed from stem
Fresh rosemary, destemmed and chopped

Add butter and onions to very large pot. Cook on medium for 10 minutes. Add the rest of the vegetables and cook for 10 minutes stirring often. add the stock, thyme and rosemary (pending volume might need to also add water). Cook for 1hr+ at mid-high. 45 minutes before serving add meat. S&P to taste. Don't forget to enjoy.

Shepherd's Pie



- 5lbs russet or Yukon gold potatoes
- 2 sticks salted butter
- 1 cup milk
- 1 pound ground lamb, or beef lamb preferred
- 1 yellow onion
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1 cup carrot, diced
- 1 cup of peas
- 1 cup green beans, chopped
- 1/2 cup red wine, Cabernet or Shiraz
- 1/2 cup beef stock

Seasonings: rosemary, thyme, salt, & pepper. Bay leaf if desired



Bring potatoes to boil and mash with butter and milk until smooth, then preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a cast iron skillet, fry ground meat and season until cooked and remove from pan when done. Then, add onion, finely chopped and fry in fat until tender and then deglaze with red wine.

Add back meat, and vegetables until they are soft and tender, and most of the moisture has cooked off. Add stock and crushed and chopped garlic.

Then, either pipette the mashed potato or smooth with a spoon on top of the mixture to make a topping for the fillings. Feel free to decorate as you wish.


Bake covered at 350 for 45 minutes, then uncovered for an additional 15 minutes.





The Mead of Poetry

This is the story of how Odin came to possess the Mead of Poetry (Old Norse Óðrærir, "Stirrer of Inspiration").

At the conclusion of the Aesir-Vanir War, the Aesir and Vanir gods and goddesses sealed their truce by spitting into a great vat. From their spittle they formed a being whom they named Kvasir ("Fermented Berry Juice"^[1]). Kvasir was the wisest human that had ever lived; none were able to present him with a question for which he didn't have a satisfying answer. He became famous and traveled throughout the world giving counsel.

Kvasir was invited to the home of two dwarves, Fjalar ("Deceiver"^[2]) and Galar ("Screamer"^[3]). Upon his arrival, the dwarves slew Kvasir and brewed mead with his blood. This mead contained Kvasir's ability to dispense wisdom, and was appropriately named $\acute{O}\delta r \alpha rir$ ("Stirrer of Inspiration"). Any who drank of it would become a poet or a scholar.

When the gods questioned them about Kvasir's disappearance, Fjalar and Galar told them that Kvasir had choked on his wisdom.

The two dwarves apparently delighted in murder. Soon after this incident, they took the giant Gilling out to sea and drowned him for sport. The sounds of Gilling's weeping wife irritated them, so they killed her as well, this time by dropping a millstone on her head as she passed under the doorway of their house.

But this last mischief got the dwarves into trouble. When Gilling's son, Suttung ("Heavy with Drink"^[4]), learned of his father's murder, he seized the dwarves and, at

low tide, carried them out to a reef that would soon be covered by the waves. The dwarves pleaded for their lives, and Suttung granted their request only when they agreed to give him the mead they had brewed with Kvasir's blood. Suttung hid the vats of mead in a chamber beneath the mountain Hnitbjorg ("Pulsing Rock"^[5]), where he appointed his daughter Gunnlod ("Invitation to Battle"^[6]) to watch over them.

Now Odin, the chief of the gods, who is restless and unstoppable in his pursuit of wisdom, was displeased with the precious mead's being hoarded away beneath a mountain. He bent his will toward acquiring it for himself and those he deemed worthy of its powers.

Disguised as a wandering farmhand, Odin went to the farm of Suttung's brother, Baugi. There he found nine servants mowing hay. He approached them, took out a whetstone from under his cloak, and offered to sharpen their scythes. They eagerly agreed, and afterwards marveled at how well their scythes cut the hay. They all declared this to be the finest whetstone they had ever seen, and each asked to purchase it. Odin consented to sell it, "but," he warned them, "you must pay a high price." He then threw the stone into the air, and, in their scramble to catch it, the nine killed each other with their scythes.

Odin then went to Baugi's door and introducted himself as "Bölverkr" ("Worker of Misfortune"). He offered to do the work of the nine servants who had, as he told it, so basely killed each other in a dispute in the field earlier that day. As his reward, he demanded a sip of Suttung's mead.

Baugi responded that he had no control of the mead and that Suttung guarded it jealously, but that if Bölverkr could truly perform the work of nine men, he would help the apparent farmhand to obtain his desire.

At the end of the growing season, Odin had fulfilled his promise to the giant, who agreed to accompany him to Suttung to inquire about the mead. Suttung, however, angrily refused. The disguised god, reminding Baugi of their bargain, convinced the giant to aid him in gaining access to Gunnlod's dwelling. The two went to a part of the mountain that Baugi knew to be nearest to the underground chamber. Odin took an auger out from his cloak and handed it to Baugi for hill to drill through the rock. The giant did so, and after much work announced that the hole was finished. Odin blew into the hole to verify Baugi's claim, and when the rock-dust blew back into his face, he knew that his companion had lied to him. The suspicious god then bade the giant to finish what he had started. When Baugi proclaimed the hole to be complete for a second time, Odin once again blew into the hole. This time the debris were blown through the


hole.

Odin thanked Baugi for his help, shifted his shape into that of a snake, and crawled into the hole. Baugi stabbed after him with the auger, but Odin made it through just in time.

Once inside, he assumed the form of a charming young man and made his way to where Gunnlod guarded the mead. He won her favor and secured a promise from her that, if he would sleep with her for three nights, she would grant him three sips of the mead. After the third night, Odin went to the mead, which was in three vats, and consumed the contents of each vat in a single draught.

Odin then changed his shape yet again, this time into that of an eagle, and flew off toward Asgard, the gods' celestial stronghold, with his prize in his throat. Suttung soon discovered this trickery, took on the form of another eagle, and flew off in pursuit of Odin.

When the gods spied their leader approaching with Suttung close behind him, they set out several vessels at the rim of their fortress. Odin reached the abode of his fellow gods before Suttung could catch him, and the giant retreated in anguish. As Odin came to the containers, he regurgitated the mead into them. As he did so, however, a few drops fell from his beak to Midgard, the world of humankind, below. These drops are the source of the abilities of all bad and mediocre poets and scholars. But the true poets and scholars are those to whom Odin dispenses his mead personally and with care.^{[7][8]}

Even a simple act of artistic devotion is in my opinion significant and noteworthy. When a piece of art is done with intention, devotion and in piety, there is something special that happens in the act of creation. So, Get After It! Go out and honor the Gods and your Ancestors with Art! I'm sure you'll do great!

Ostara



Ostara, like many of our Gods, is one of whom we know little. Much of the lore regarding her was lost to time. Though some scholars have debated about her for years, even amongst Christians such as Bede, We do know that she played a pivotal role in the yearly cycle. We also know that she was often seen as a youthful maiden with a joyous demeanor, frequently dancing happily and making merry in the light of the spring sun.

Though her lore is shrouded in mystery, we do know much of her Holy Day as well as the things associated with it. Even as worship of the Goddess herself declined as the culture and faith of the people changed, her Holiday was so prolific that some form of it survived the centuries with many of its traditions intact.

The Holy Tide of Ostara is a time of renewal as the ice and snow of winter diminishes and the warmth of spring ushers in new life. The grass is rejuvenated, new flowers bloom, the leaves return to the trees, and the once-frozen waters flow freely again.

An important aspect of this Holy Tide is the association with purity and youthful innocence. In fact, a common theme in the tradition of Ostara is that of innocence. This is fitting as springtime brings with it new life, which is characterized by innocence. This is why, I believe, we see a great focus on the celebration of childhood and youth.

In keeping with the theme of renewal and youth it is said that during this time Holy Water would be collected from the dew or from brooks wherein young maidens would bathe. This water was said to restore the youth of those who washed with it. By this we can see a connection between Ostara and youthful vitality; we can also see a connection with renewal of life and energy. As the hardships of winter begin to fade and spring sets in, we are met not only with the relief the new season brings but also with the joy of experiencing new growth.

Maidens in white were also said to be commonly seen playing in the fields in historical times. This further strengthens the connection with youth. I believe this also implies an association with youthful, and pure, femininity. In this way, and through the activities of young women, we see a celebration of the evolution of the feminine throughout the lifetime. It was common for people to observe rituals, dances, or other celebrations of feminine fertility, beauty, and grace.

The expression of gentle femininity continues with the more matronly activities. We can see this manifest in traditions often led by our women such as egg painting, baking, and organizing games for the children just to name a few. This maternal interaction forms an essential part of the celebration of the cycle of a woman's life, as well as the innocence of childhood and the beauty of Motherhood.

In keeping with the theme of fertility, men's fertility was also commonly celebrated. In England, it was not uncommon for Maypoles to be erected and the dances to take place. This tradition directly references masculine fertility. Furthermore, the masculine may have been celebrated and expressed through dances of their own. Indeed, dancing seems to have been an integral part of the celebrations observed on Ostara. In fact, some sources say that Ostara herself can commonly be seen dancing.

The time of Ostara has also been long associated with love and romance. As the fertility of the land returns so is the pure love of man and woman reflected in this renewal of life. As this time is so often a celebration of fertility it is logical to see this as a time to celebrate also the beauty inherent in those relationships which may themselves create new life.

In celebrating this holiday, there are customs which have evolved over time. We are all

aware of the association with the Egg and Hare, which represent fertility. There is debate as to whether the egg was actually a part of Asatru tradition, or it was added to the holiday by later Christian revelers. I believe the significance of the egg could be argued to lay in the laying cycles of hens who cease laying during winter months and resume during spring, further highlighting the return of fertility to the land.

It was also common to hold bonfires and vigils, meant to create and protect purity. Indeed, many of the activities associated with May Day seem to have commonly been practiced on Ostara as well. This makes sense as if May Day serves often to celebrate fertility, it is Ostara which originally ushered it in.



Another custom observed is the cooking of Hot Cross Buns. Again, there are those who have suggested this is a custom done by later Christians, however I believe it was merely adapted. These buns could be seen as representing the Solar Cross and harken to Ostara who was known as the "*Goddess of the growing light of spring*." -Jakob Grimm, Teutonic Mythology.

Grimm speculates on the nature of Ostara and some of the customs which survived in Folk Tradition:

"Ostara, Eástre seems therefore to have been the divinity of the radiant dawn, of upspringing light, a spectacle that brings joy and blessing Bonfires were lighted at Easter and according to popular belief of long standing, the moment the sun rises on Easter Sunday morning, she gives three joyful leaps, she dances for joy ... Water drawn on the Easter morning is, like that at Yule, holy and healing ... Maidens clothed in white, who at Easter, at the season of returning spring, show themselves in clefts of the rock and on mountains, are suggestive of the ancient goddess.

But if we admit, goddesses, then, in addition to Nerthus, Ostara has the strongest claim to consideration. To what we said on p. 290 I can add some significant facts. The heathen Easter had much in common with May-feast and the reception of spring, particularly in the matter of bonfires. Then, through long ages there seem to have lingered among the people Easter-games so-called, which the church itself had to tolerate: I allude especially to the custom of Easter eggs, and to the Easter tale...." —Jakob Grimm, Teutonic Mythology Vol I. & II.

Spring is also a celebration of victory. Victory over the hardships of winter. In ancient times winter was a far more difficult affair. Survival was by no means guaranteed, and without very careful planning and stockpiling throughout the year one could easily fall victim to the many dangers of a frozen tundra, not the least of which being starvation.

Today we have things much easier, yet winter is not without its challenges. From the common Seasonal Affective Disorder, to the difficulties of getting around, and worse, winter still presents a time of greater challenge for people around the world.

I also like to look at the metaphor of the winter of the soul. As we pass through difficult and challenging phases of our lives it can be easy to get lost in the metaphorical ice. Ostara, therefore, is a time that I believe we should all look upon the difficulties we

have overcome and to celebrate the renewal we have experienced and created for ourselves.

Just as new life springs up in the world around us, so too can it be nurtured within one's own soul.
