



Hail Freyr! We ask you to join us here, Witness our devotion, Hear our praise, Receive our gifts!

Folk, prepare your gifts for Freyr. From your heart to your hand, and from your hand to the horn, give the best and brightest of yourselves to him.

Ask your hornbearer to collect the gifts of the Folk

"Freyr! The horn is heavy with the gifts of your Folk. If you find them worthy, take them from us now. Hail Freyr!"

Hold the horn high and await the acceptance of Freyr.

Pour the gifts into the bowl.

Refill the horn.

"Freyr,

We have given you our gifts.

We have offered you our love,

We have offered you our praise,

Our strength, our energy,

Pieces of the best of ourselves.

We ask, should you to bless the gathered Folk.

For the fertility of our fields,

And for the fertility of our women.

May we be blessed with prosperity and good health.

May our animals, our crops, and our children grow healthy and strong.

May the storms we face as Folk be mild. May we weather them with our heads held high,

With courage and with dignity.

May the summer rains nourish our lands

Receive the gifts of Freyr. Walk the horn around the circle of gathered folk and offer them the gifts of Freyja.

Pour remaining mead from the horn in the bowl.

"This blot has ended.

We have given our gifts and received gifts in return.

Take with you, and into your homes, the blessings of Freyr.

Go forward with passion, with strength, and achieve the victory that awaits you!

THE MAYPOLE DANCE

May Day celebrations are not complete without a May Pole! The May Pole itself is a fertility symbol, with the pole representing a strong masculine energy. The feminine is represented by the beautiful flora decorated crown and the ribbons that wrapped around the pole during the maypole dance.

Following Freyrblot, ask the women to attach the ribbons to the top of the pole and then the menfolk to carry the Maypole "plant" it in a sturdy place already arranged. Divide

the group into two groups, those who will dance clockwise and those who will dance counterclockwise. Distribute them along the ribbons evenly. As the group dances, they should go "over" or "under" the person dancing in the opposite direction. The Maypole dance is best done with a good Polka! Once reaching the ends of the ribbons, secure the ends to the pole.

Baldrshof tradition is that those women seeking fertility, asnip a piece of the ribbon ends and take them home with them.


Words from Our Gothar

"Warrior Faith" in the Modern Age



Asatru is often called a "warrior faith", and there is some truth to this. Our male ancestors often fought with sword, shield, axe, and spear to protect the things that mattered to them, and that still matter to us. They were almost all required to have some sort of martial bearing, and to be able to stare conflict in the eye without taking a single step backward.

We, those warriors' descendants, live in a time where comfort is king for many people, in the deepest and scariest sense of that phrase. Martial prowess is no longer expected from us, or seen as necessary. There are not currently any physical battles to fight; no need to smash through a shield wall, no need to plant some archers in that tree line over there, etc... However, as humans, we have a physical need to exercise that aggression. And as Aryan humans, we have a need to exercise that aggression in a HEALTHY way.



The best options for this are weightlifting, and combat sports. We will never feel the rush of smashing a war axe through someone's shield, but you CAN feel the raw power of lifting iron off of your chest, or from blocking another man's left hook.

This is a call: if you want to call yourself a warrior, get in the gym. Put on the boxing gloves, or the ace bandages around your joints, and get to work. Face that fight. Make yourself solid in a world of mush.

The Soul Complex, a summary



It's an age-old question. It's taken up many pages in many books, it's been pondered by philosophers, social commentators, and religious leaders for centuries. "What is the soul?" Many cultures across this planet have differing viewpoints on this topic. Recently we had a Gothar meeting on the subject. By the time you read this, Alsherjargothi Flavel and Witan Herul will have had a discussion on Victory Never

Sleeps about the Soul and its many parts.

Webster's Dictionary defines it as such,

- : the immaterial essence, animating principle, or actuating cause of an individual life
- : the spiritual principle embodied in human beings, all rational and spiritual beings, or the universe
- : a person's total self
- : an active or essential part
- : a moving spirit
- : the moral and emotional nature of human beings
- : the quality that arouses emotion and sentiment.
- : spiritual or moral force
- : FERVOR

That's the definition, but what do we, as Asatruar define as the soul?

Simply, it's what animates you, makes you unique, it's what makes you...you. It's what makes you human, it's what separates us from animals.

We, in the Asatru Folk Assembly believe that the soul, is broken down into parts. Here in this edition of The Runestone, we will explore the different parts of the Soul Complex, and how each part of the Soul makes us who we are. This will not be exhaustive, but a summary, pulling from Asatru, A Native Spirituality, by Founder Stephen McNallen, and Runelore, by Edred Thorsson. Over the coming months, we will break down each component of the soul, pulling from different sources. If we were to try to compile all we know here, this will turn into a book. Rather than do that, we'll spread it out over the coming months.

Now that we have defined what the soul is, let's break down the soul, as it is seen in Asatru, in a summarized list.

- 1. Lík, The physical body.
- 2. Ek, the ego.
- 3. Hugr, the logical mind.
- 4. Minní, memory.
- 5. Önd, Vital Breath.
- 6. Hamr, The Projected Self.
- 7. Sál, The Shade Self, that which is hidden.
- 8. Hamingja, The Luck or Personal Spiritual Might.
- 9. Fylgia, or the Fetch, The Primal Essence
- 10. Oðr, or Wode, the Ecstatic State, the combination of Hamr and Sál.

In the coming months, we will do a deeper dive into each component, beginning with the Lik. We will explore exercises for each component, and how to use each for your spiritual journey.

Each component makes up the whole, and we will also explore how each part interplays with some or all of the others.

Hail the Gods.







We chose this because it fully encompasses the AFA culture of victory, and how our students gaining knowledge will lead to that victory.



Day of Remembrance

Else Christensen



Originally born in Denmark, Else Christensen (nee Ochsner) was one of the leading figures in the modern Asastu movement. As a young woman, she left her hometown of Esbjerg in favor of Copenhagen. It was during her time in Copenhagen that Else awoke to the ideas of National Socialism in the midst of right-wing and leftwing radical struggles. She met and married Aage Alex Christensen, and together they were members of the Danish Workers Party.

Both she and her husband were imprisoned after the German invasion of Denmark in 1940 for their involvement with elements of the National Workers Party. After their release from prison Else and her husband emigrated to Canada, via England.

Even from Canada, Else continued to nurture her desire to find a place for her own people. It was during this time, while she was reaching out to far-right activists across North America that she first discovered Odinism in a pamphlet titled Call of Our Ancient Nordic Religion, by Alexander Rud Mills. This was the beginning of Else's dedication to the revival of the worship of the Norse Gods. Her understanding of our relationship with the Gods was heavily influenced by the idea that the Gods were encoded in the collective unconscious of the Aryan race.

In 1969 Else Christensen founded the Odinist Fellowship. Until her death in 2005, Else worked tirelessly for her folk, spreading the word of our faith and our Gods to all who would listen. She founded a prison outreach program that proved to be instrumental to

many men. She wrote and published many publications. Her efforts saw her recognized as the Folk- Mother to Asatruar everywhere.

So, what can we learn from this story?

We don't always know where our stories end. We can't always see the ramifications of our thoughts when put into action. Else was just one single woman. She was a woman who believed in unpopular ideas in a time when those ideas were definitively unpopular. Despite being imprisoned for those beliefs she did not give up.

Our current times are, in many ways, similar to the ones that Else dealt with. They are turbulent and wrought with anger on all sides. We stand at the precipice of a new world, but we have no way of knowing which way the tides will turn. Else didn't turn and run. She stood and faced the future. In doing so she became one of the most important women in the Asatru movement to date.

When things are hard, when public opinion would have you conform, just remember. Your story hasn't reached its end yet, and only you can control the direction the story takes.

Stand strong.

Stand with Else.

Women decorated their windows and doors with flowers and wove them into their hair.

We have survived the harsh months when stagnation is so easy a thing to fall into. When the celebration is done, the real hard work begins. The plan that was set into motion at Charming of the Plow will now begin the active stage. Those seeds that you planted, or that project that you planned at Ostara, will now need real tending to. Mayday marks the beginning. It marks the start of growth.

Freyr's Harvest Feast in Montana | September 22nd-24th



Freyr's Harvest Feast is the time to honor the Gods after a productive year's Harvest. On September 22nd through the 24th, we gather together for a weekend filled with activities that honor the three Vanir deities Njord, Freyr, and Freya.

During the course of the weekend, the folk gathers together for three blots using mead donated by Heinlein's Hollow Meadery.

In addition to blot, we see the display of Freyr's Proposal on stage (stage under construction), the viking games tournament with a prize to be revealed at the feast as well as access to the Drengr Dinner where all previous years' champions are invited out the day before the event.

In addition to brawn, the brain is tested in our Hnefatafl competition. While this competition is less fierce the bragging rights are still pretty good. Guests can also test their luck at a game of Orlog.

While there are plenty of contests, we still have plenty of time for several workshops, and speeches by guest speakers. Craftsmen will also bring their wares out to sell and

authors to sign their books. An AFA benefiting auction will provide ample opportunities to walk away with a bag full of spoils.

The whole event is hosted on a private 20-acre ranch in a very low-population area. It's on the river and away from prying eyes. So not only do you get to enjoy a full event you can take in the beauty of rural Montana, enjoy the river and see what an AFA homestead looks like. An optional tour and sumbel will be held in the early morning for those wanting to see inside a proper meadery.

Lodging is straightforward as well. Bring an RV or tent and camp under the beautiful stars. Trust us when we say there's more of them visible than wherever you're coming from and on lucky nights the Northern Lights can be seen.

For those who want less rustic accommodations, there are numerous hotels and motels within a reasonable driving distance. In a few more years we will have cabins available too!

So that's lodging but everyone's got to eat right? Well, we got you covered as well. The meals are all plentiful and delicious, none more so than the feast itself. Last year we filled the dining hall with food and refreshments and this year we aim to provide just as much good fare. Five to ten gallons of mead will be provided for the feast according to turnout and the couples dance that follows is always great fun.

Remember to dress your best at the feast and dance but it won't all be formal. For the first blot, we go into the water to honor Njord. Ladies especially, make sure that you wear clothes that you're not only comfortable getting wet but are also modest when wet.

While the prospect of getting into the water in September might be daunting to some, the month has a wonderful climate. It has a high of 70 and a low of 50 with a nice midday breeze.

The truth is unless you come out you won't know what you're missing so don't make that mistake and come out to Freyr's Harvest Feast.



Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made

cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Good Mornings Start with Fresh Bagels and Coffee



In America we may associate bagels with New York City, but they have a long and storied Aryan past. They are believed to have originally been invented in German monasteries during the Middle Ages, much like their cousins the pretzel. They were brought from Germany into Poland by peasant farm workers. They have become a staple food in the country going by the name obwarzanek and are found in most Central European countries. In America today, bagels are found everywhere in grocery stores, cafes, and drive thrus, but for me, nothing beats homemade. They're simple and once you get a knack for it, they're very easy to make.

For the dough:

1 and 1/2 C warm water

4 tsp yeast

4 C flour

1 Tbsp honey

2 tsp salt

Eggwash:

- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 Tbsp water

For Boiling:

2 Quarts water

1/4 Cup honey

Any bagel seasoning you might like on top (everything, onion/garlic salt, coarse sea salt, sesame seeds)

Add yeast, warm water and honey to a mixing bowl or stand mixer, allow yeast time to activate and foam (5-7 minutes)

Mix in flour and salt, forming stiff, dry dough

Knead for 5-7 minutes or until smooth and stiff

Allow the dough to rest in a clean, covered dish for an hour or until doubled in size

Preheat oven to 425°F

Line two baking sheets with parchment paper

Put the water and honey for boiling on the stove at medium heat allowing it to warm as you shape the bagels

Divide dough into 8 equal sized parts and form each into a ball

To form the bagel shape, slightly flatten each ball and poke your finger through the center of it. Gently stretch from both sides until the hole in the center reaches around 2 inches.

Allow each bagel a few minutes to rest before boiling

When the water reaches boiling, place two bagels at a time in and allow them to boil 2-3 minutes. They should float when they're done.

Set each bagel on the parchment as it's removed from the water to give them time to cool off.

Once your bagels have had time to cool, gently dip the top side only in the egg wash then dust with seasoning.

Bake 20-25 minutes, until golden brown.

It's important to give your bagels a bit to rest out of the oven to allow them to become chewy and delicious. I usually let them sit for 15-20 minutes before cutting into one.

Serve with butter, cream cheese, jam, as a breakfast sandwich or with soup. They're delicious however you choose to enjoy.

Ingredients

- 2 English Cucumbers
- ½ C sour cream
- 1 Tbsp white vinegar

- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 Tbsp fresh dill chopped
- ½ tsp salt
- black pepper to taste


Instructions

- Peel the cucumbers if desired and thinly slice them with a mandolin slicer. The thinner the better! Put them in a large salad bowl.
- In a medium bowl, whisk together sour cream, vinegar, sugar, and dill. Salt and pepper to taste.
- Pour dressing over cucumber slices and toss until combined.
- Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight.
- Serve with a slotted spoon.

There is a certain mindset that is infecting some of our Folk today that is uncomfortable to discuss, but still needs to be addressed. This is a negative, defeatist perspective of victimhood. In the current internet parlance it could be called a "black pilled" mindset.

We live in an information age, where we are bombarded by news stories, opinions, and images that affect the way we perceive the world around us. There is a lot that is wrong with our society, and with the world. I don't mean to minimize the challenges that face our Folk, or humanity as a whole, and we certainly should be active, individually and collectively, to do what we can to make things better.

However, when someone becomes so immersed in the gloom and pessimism that the many screens we sit in front of, or hold in our hand, present, it can paralyze their will to act positively on those things they can actually impact. And, honestly, sometimes it's just easier to wallow in negativity and self pity than take on the work to improve things for ourselves, our families, and our Folk.

Anxiety over things outside our control weakens us – especially in that it distracts us and saps our will to move forward and make real progress in ways that advance ourselves, our people, and our church. No individual can "fix the world", but you can improve yourself. Spend time learning about our Lore and faith; read about the great achievements and history of our people – this will strengthen your mind. Grow your connection to the Gods through ritual, prayer, and meditation; participate in AFA 'in person' events – these activities will strengthen you spiritually. Work on your diet, health, and fitness – thereby making your body strong.

Victory – for each of us, as individuals, and for all of us, as a Folk – is the destiny the Gods desire for us. They have blessed us with the innate abilities to achieve that destiny. It is our responsibility to ignore the siren song of those who would demoralize us, to focus on the good, the great, things we are capable of accomplishing.

April With Folk








My daughter turned ten and I couldn't be more proud of her. She is very crafty and loves to read. I admire her will and am so grateful to have her and the rest of my clan.

Prairie Fire Kindred



I'd like to give a little context to our flag. It's beautiful and I couldn't have come up with something so incredible without Josh Rapin and Madison East taking the ideas I had and putting them into images, thank you both so much. It's also incredibly meaningful for our Kindred and I would like to say it's a summary of what the AFA has done for us.

The name of our Kindred is Prairie Fire. A prairie fire is a fire that scorches the earth with incredible force and speed. This has become a major, major issue here in Nebraska with the advent of monoculture and chemical pesticides because a prairie fire will reverse that man made shift and revert the fields they have spent generations perfecting into its natural state within a year. The heat from the fire activates those deeply buried seeds of the long gone prairie and allows nature to heal regardless of what the corporate field owners want planted there. This is exactly what we hope to bring to Nebraska and to the AFA at large. We want to help bring that awakening that burns away the centuries of Christianity burying our Asatru blood memory and allow our Folk a fighting chance at knowing who they are meant to be and what's dormant inside of them. The Prairie Fire will burn away the old self and give us the chance to sprout and connect to the Folk Soul.

The flag colors and symbols represent the colors and shapes of Nebraska. The golden fields, the Western bluffs and cliffs, the beautiful blue sky over the rolling hills.

The flag's focal point, the golden Sonnenrad, represents the new day dawning on our Folk. It represents the power and might of the Æsir and the cyclical nature of our stories and awakening. I feel that we are entering a new Golden Age of Asatru and for the Æsir

and I wanted to capture that on the flag.

The red outline is a representation of the ALU-ULA formula. Without cluttering up the flag we wanted to show the gifting cycle. From the Folk to the Gods to the Folk. The red was Burt's idea and I think it not only visually enhances the flag but the symbolism is amazing. Lastly we have the goldenrod. State flower of Nebraska, used by our Pioneer Ancestors to find water and therefore life. It can be used for dowsing and it grows overtop our many buried springs, giving hope to the Folk who struggled and sacrificed so greatly to build something truly their own.

Hail the Gods! Hail the Folk! Hail the AFA! Hail the Folk who made the Prairie Fire Kindred possible! Hail Jason Gallagher! A special thank you to Jason for pitching the idea and putting this beautiful thing into motion.


It was a beautiful day, and we had a wonderful time together enjoying the sights and sounds of the forest.

April 22nd was the Day of Remembrance for one of our Heroes, John Gibbs-Bailey.

John Gibbs Bailey or "Hoskuld" as he was known by, remains a somewhat enigmatic, yet foundational figure within the AFA's heroes but he is Worthy to be honored for the extraordinary work he accomplished during the reconstructive work of our belief system. He, along with John Yeowell, "Stubba", and others including our Founder, and Folk Mother, helped rekindle our Faith and re-establish Nine of what are commonly called The Noble Virtues, and rediscover our traditions in the way we honor the Aesir and ancestors. He was active in the community of our folk and helped establish some of the early organizations. By all accounts he was a kind man, with deep blue eyes and a long white beard at the time of his passing. He possessed a deep love of the folk and the Aesir from his awakening to Asatru around the Turn of the Century until his passing in the 1980s. From the accounts I've gathered, he was an honorable and upright man until his passing and his influence was invaluable to the reconstruction of Asatru. Hail the

This month, I hosted a moot at the St. Louis County Heritage & Arts Center and Train Depot!








Fresh Air with Wisconsin Folk




It's was nice that we were fortunate this month to be able to have crisp air but fair weather. So we took advantage as best we could and planned a hike.






It was a wonderful time and beautiful weather for it!

We are the future Ancestors, act accordingly!


